## Mental Health in Primary Schools (MHiPS) team

We're excited to be part of the **Mental Health in Primary Schools (MHiPS)** program, which supports the wellbeing of all students in our school. This initiative helps build a whole-school approach to mental health by providing extra support, training, and resources for staff to better understand and respond to students' social and emotional needs. It means we can work more closely with families, support students earlier, and create an even more caring, inclusive, and mentally healthy school environment for everyone.

Our Mental Health in Primary Schools (MHiPS) team is Susan Vissenjoux, Kelly Jacob, Colene Farrell, and Brian Graham.

## What Will the MHiPS Team Do?

- Promote a whole-school approach to mental health and wellbeing
- Support teachers and Education Support Staff
- Build strong partnerships with families
- Offer parent/carer engagement and learning opportunities
- Help students build emotional awareness and resilience
- Celebrate wellbeing days (e.g. R U OK? Day, Harmony Day)
- Provide targeted support for students in need

Our goal is to create a school where every child feels safe, valued and supported — and where mental health is part of everyday conversations.

## **Understanding the Zones of Regulation**

At school, we have started using the Zones of Regulation to help students learn how to understand and manage their emotions in a healthy way. The Zones are a simple, colour-coded tool that helps children recognise how they're feeling and what they might need to get back to a "ready to learn" state.

Blue Zone: Sad, tired, sick, or bored

Green Zone: Calm, focused, happy – ready to learn

Yellow Zone: Frustrated, silly, nervous, or starting to lose control

Red Zone: Angry, out of control, overwhelmed

We link these Zones to characters from *Inside Out* to help students make connections:

Sadness (Blue Zone) Joy (Green Zone) Fear/Disgust (Yellow Zone) Anger (Red Zone)

To support students, we use strategies like sensory tools (e.g. fidget items, calming music, quiet spaces), brain breaks (like movement, stretching, or a short walk), and breathing techniques to help them move back toward the Green Zone.

Families can support at home by using the same language (e.g. "What zone are you in right now?"), and helping children identify which strategies help them feel calm, focused and 'ready to learn and play'.

Together, we can help our students to build emotional awareness, resilience, and the tools to thrive—both in and out of the classroom!



A Friendship Ninja understands the 4 Friendship Facts and puts out their Friendship Fires® when they ignite.

A Friendship Ninja stands up for themselves and their friends. A Friendship Ninja makes new friends and understands that friendships change, and that's okay.

Above all else, a Friendship Ninja is someone you want to be friends with because they're true to who they are!



### FRIEND-O-CYCLE

The normal cycle of conflict in a friendship.

The phases of the Friend-o-Cycle are:

- Healthy Friendship
- Friendship Fire
- Confront the Issue
- Talk-it-Out
- Forgive & Forget
- Closer & Stronger
- Healthy Friendship!

Normal conflicts like hurt feelings, disagreements, and misunderstandings.

A visual tool that helps assess how we are feeling in our friendships,

Intentionally cruel, rude, malicious behaviour that is designed to hurt someone.

A set of four facts that help us have realistic expectations in our friendships so we understand what is normal.

- No friendship (relationship) is perfect.
- 2. Every friendship is different.
- Trust & Respect are the two most important qualities of a friendship.
- 4. Friendships change... and that's okay!



## QUICK COMEBACK


A very short word or phrase that is used when someone is Mean-on-Purpose.

National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, family day cares, childcare centres, bookshops, family homes and many other places around the country. Now in its 25th successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6.

This year, the book was read by the author, Deborah Frenkel, and live streamed for students to view her reading her own book. Students also watched illustrator Danny Snell draw Tinka and then had a go drawing it for themselves. This book was also celebrated through other activities and will feature as part of our specialist programs. 

## SAME-DAY NOTIFICATION OF UNEXPLAINED STUDENT ABSENCES

### FACT SHEET FOR SCHOOLS

Protecting the safety and wellbeing of children through reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/carers and schools.

Parents and carers have an obligation to notify the school of their child's absence as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using the school's preferred method, including use of an online IT or app, by telephone or by email.

## New School Attendance Guidelines

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools must contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same-day of an unexplained student absence.

The same-day notification requirement supports the safety and wellbeing of all students. Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and parents/carers need to know if their child is not at school. Prompt communication also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of a child's education. Children and young people who regularly attend school and complete Year 12 or an equivalent qualification have better health outcomes, better employment outcomes, and higher incomes across their lives.

Many schools are already implementing a same-day notification system. The Department of Education and Training (the Department) is supporting schools to meet this new requirement using available online solutions where practicable and ensuring parents and carers are aware of their responsibility to notify schools of a child's absence through promotional material including the Parent/carer Factsheet.

## Schools and parents working together to support student attendance

Building positive and collaborative relationships through clear communications with parents and carers is critical to the successful implementation of the same-day notification requirement.

The responsibility needs to be underpinned by shared understandings and expectations about the procedures for monitoring, recording and follow-up of student attendance as outlined in the school's Attendance Policy. Distributing the school's Attendance Policy to parents and carers will help ensure they are aware of their obligation to notify the school of their child's absence and minimise the follow-up required by schools.

## What is the school's responsibility?

- Notify parents/carers: The school must notify parents and carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained absence. This should occur in the morning allowing time for the parent or carer to respond. Schools can choose how they advise parent and carers based on their local context e.g. by email, push notification via downloaded app, SMS or phone call.
- Follow-up (where required): At times the parent or carer may not be able to be reached because the school does not have their correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.). In this instance, the school should attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on the child's file held by the school, where possible, on the same day of the unexplained absence.
- Record student absences data: Under the <u>School Attendance Guidelines</u> schools are required to record or transpose absence data in CASES21, eCASES or a third party software which is compatible with CASES21. Schools using third party software are required to import attendance data into CASES21 on a monthly basis.

## Online solutions to same-day notifications

The Department is committed to supporting schools to meet their attendance requirements through an automated IT platform where practicable. Schools can decide which IT platform to use and current options include:

- eCases (a departmentally provided adjunct to CASES21) to generate SMS alerts
- third party software to alert parents of their child's absence via SMS or push notification

## Parent/carer's responsibility

Parents/carers are required to ensure their child attends school every day and have an obligation to contact the school to notify the school of their child's absence. Parents/carers should inform the school in advance of known upcoming absences, or on the day of absence as soon as practicable. In addition, in order to implement this requirement, it is essential that parent/carers provide schools with their most up-to-date contact details.

## **LUNCH ORDERS**

Lunch orders are available each Wednesday. There is an ordering system via the QKR app and orders must be placed by 8pm each Tuesday for Wednesdays lunch.

Late orders cannot be accepted.





## STUDENT SUPERVISION

All bike and scooter riders are required to wear a bike helmet in Victoria.

Approved helmets have the Australian Standards Mark TM (AS/NZS) 2063) and will be marked as suitable for cycling.

Children under the age of 12 may ride on footpaths as can a supervising adult. They are required to give way to pedestrians and to wheel their bicycles over pedestrian and children's crossings.

Bikes/scooters can be stored in our bike shed during school hours.

Also, by law everyone must wear a seat belt when travelling in a car in Australia.
