### About the Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS)

The Attitudes to School Survey is conducted annually in Term 2. All schools must participate in the Attitudes to School Survey, providing the opportunity for students from Year 4 to Year 12 to complete the survey. The survey provides data that is invaluable in understanding the student perspective of their school and to improve the schooling experience.

We value student voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction and will be asking your child about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, resilience, bullying, health and wellbeing, physical activity, and life in general. This year, the survey will be conducted at FCPS from 11th-13th June.

### **School Uniforms**

As the colder weather settles in, we'd like to remind families to **dress children in layers** so they can stay warm but also remove layers easily as they warm up during active play. We have lots of energetic learners who love to run, climb and explore. If you haven't already done so, it is also time to add gumboots, slippers and a change of clothes and socks to the school bag.

Please ensure that **all items of clothing are clearly named**, including jackets, coats, and beanies – this helps all of us to return lost items quickly. We can also all work together to remind children to collect their jackets from outside at the end of break times.

While staying warm is important, we also ask that students continue to wear school uniform. If you're in need of winter essentials like coats, beanies or warm jackets, our on-site uniform shop has stock available.

### **Student Dress Code Policy update**

Changes to the Department of Education Student Dress Code policy were announced in April. As per requirements, the Ferny Creek School Council will review our existing policy to ensure it meets the new guidelines. Please see below for a summary of the changes.

The Department of Education aims to provide every student in Victoria with equal access to high-quality public education. To assist in achieving this aim, student uniforms must be affordable, which means they must be financially accessible without creating an unreasonable burden on families or a barrier to enrolment for students. To ensure affordability, schools must not include branded pants, shorts, skirts, skorts or socks in their uniform.

The student dress code policy has been updated to help make uniforms more affordable. The update includes requirements that:

- all student dress codes ensure uniform are affordable
- uniforms do not include branded 'bottoms' such as pants, shorts, skirts, skorts, leggings and socks.

Schools and school councils must review and update their existing student dress code policies in line with the new affordability requirements by the end of Term 4, 2025. As part of this review schools must remove any branded 'below the waist' items from their school dress codes and consider additional strategies for reducing uniform costs.

From 2026, schools cannot include branded 'below the waist' items in their student uniform but they can continue to have branded tops including t-shirts, jumpers and jackets. Students may continue to wear existing branded 'below the waist' uniform items until outgrown or worn out.

The change in policy immediately impacts all branded 'below the waist' uniform items, including branded pants, shorts, skirts, skorts, leggings and socks. From the start of 2026 schools cannot include these items in their student uniform. Schools can continue to have branded tops including t-shirts, jumpers and jackets. Most school dresses are customised, rather than branded, and can therefore continue to be included as an item in a student uniform.

Students can continue to wear all branded 'below the waist' uniform items until they are outgrown or worn out, including during the 2026 school year and beyond. Schools can also continue to sell or provide second-hand branded 'below the waist' items to families. Students can continue to wear these items until they are worn out.

### Please Chat About Mushrooms

With the recent wet weather, mushrooms and fungi have been popping up around our school grounds. While many are harmless, some can be **toxic or cause skin irritation**.

We kindly ask families to **have a quick chat with your child** about not touching or picking mushrooms they see during play. Our staff are keeping an eye out but an extra reminder from home helps keep everyone safe.

### **Stranger safety**

We'd like to take a moment to remind all families about the importance of **stranger safety**, especially for children walking to and from school. Please talk with your child about **not talking to or going near people they don't know**, even if they seem friendly. It's important that children know to **seek help from a trusted adult** if they ever feel unsure or unsafe.

At school, we continue to remind students to **follow established routines**, stay within designated areas, and check in with staff if something doesn't feel right. Your conversations at home reinforce these important messages and help keep everyone safe.

### **PA System**

Thankyou for your patience as we undergo an important upgrade of our PA system. The system has currently been reset to the default music times as the upgrade is carried out. We understand that this may have caused some confusion in the mornings but please be assured that it is business as usual and doors are open at 8.50am to ensure that all students are settled and ready to learn by 9am. We will keep you updated and notify you of any additional changes.

### Fun Facts for Parents - Friendology & the Four Friendship Facts

At our school, we're supporting children to build strong, healthy friendships through the URSTRONG Friendology program – a fun, evidence-based approach that teaches kids how to be great friends and how to handle tricky friendship moments with confidence.

Here are the **Four Friendship Facts** we have started learning about – and how you can support them at home:

### Friendship Fact #1: No friendship is perfect

Just like all relationships, friendships have ups and downs. It's normal to have disagreements sometimes! We're helping children understand that small bumps are okay – and they can be worked through.



### Friendship Fact #2: Every friendship is different

Some friends are sporty; others are quiet or creative. Kids are learning it's okay to have different kinds of friends – and that each friendship is unique in its own special way.



We're encouraging children to think about how they treat others and how they'd like to be treated in return. Trust and respect help friendships grow stronger!





### Friendship Fact #4: Friendships change... and that's okay

Children grow, change and develop new interests – and sometimes friendships shift too. We're teaching them that it's okay to let go of friendships that don't feel right and how to move on kindly.

By learning these simple facts, students are becoming more resilient, empathetic and socially aware. Thank you for talking with your child about what they're learning – it helps build a consistent message between home and school.

### ATTENDANCE FACT SHEET FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

School is better when you're here

In Victoria everyone aged from 6 - 17 has to go to school.

Missing one day a fortnight is the same as missing 4 whole weeks of school a year.

From Foundation to Year 12 that adds up to 1.5 years of school!

School is better when you attend. Your friends and your teachers notice that you are away and wonder if you are OK.

Right now, being at school is the most important thing you need to do for your future. School helps you build good habits for later on in life. You might think school is just about Maths and English but you're also learning about how to work with other people and how to solve problems.

Being at school every day also means you are becoming more independent as a learner and interacting with your friends and teachers. If you are at school you can get help from your teachers and friends and won't have to try to learn things in your own time.

Being an adult probably seems far away but we know that young people who attend school more frequently have better outcomes after school too. This means they earn more money, have better job opportunities and are generally healthier. So being at school really does make a difference!

Unless you are so sick you can't get out of bed or there is an event like a funeral, you should be at school. Every day you are away is a day of classes and social connection you miss out on. Taking a day off for your birthday or go shopping isn't a good reason to miss school.

When you are away from school, you miss out on all the big stuff – class discussions and all the interaction that happens in a classroom, the chance to get help from teachers and the opportunity to practice skills and gain knowledge. Being away means you might miss out on a lot of learning or that you need to catch up in your time.

Being away also means you also miss out on playing with your friends. Being away from school a lot can be lonely. It has a big impact on relationships and social connections.







Getting to school on time everyday can be about having a good routine.

If you find yourself running late or missing school because you're disorganised, try:

- · Asking your parents for help getting ready
- · Having a set time to go to bed
- Leaving all technology out of your bedroom
- Packing your school bag the night before with everything you need
- Having a set time for breakfast

### Sometimes, though it can just be hard to go to school.

You might feel overwhelmed by the work or things might be tough with your friends. Maybe you don't feel safe at school or you really dislike a teacher or things at home aren't great. Perhaps you're feeling down or anxious and don't even really know why.

Whatever the situation is, staying away from school isn't the answer. Many people want to help you. Try talking to:

- Your parents or another adult family member
- A trusted teacher or adult at school

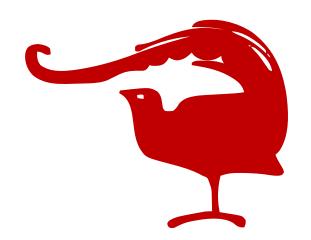




### Snapshots from STEM

### STUDENT SUPERVISION

All bike and scooter riders are required to wear a bike helmet in Victoria.

Approved helmets have the Australian Standards Mark TM (AS/NZS) 2063) and will be marked as suitable for cycling.

Children under the age of 12 may ride on footpaths as can a supervising adult. They are required to give way to pedestrians and to wheel their bicycles over pedestrian and children's crossings.

Bikes/scooters can be stored in our bike shed during school hours.

Also, by law everyone must wear a seat belt when travelling in a car in Australia.
